



Petition of Boston Gas Company, doing business as National Grid, pursuant to G.L. c. 164, § 94 and 220 CMR 5.00, for Approval of a General Increase in Base Distribution Rates for Gas Service and a Performance Based Ratemaking Plan.

On November 13, 2020, Boston Gas Company ("Boston Gas"), doing business as National Grid ("National Grid" or "Company"), filed a petition with the Department of Public Utilities ("Department") for an increase in gas distribution rates. The Department has docketed this matter as D.P.U. 20-120 and has suspended the effective date of the proposed rate increase until October 1, 2021, to investigate the propriety of the Company's request. The Company represents that it will implement any change in rates beginning November 1, 2021. The Company was last granted an increase in distribution rates in <u>Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company</u>, D.P.U. 17-170 (2018).

National Grid seeks to increase its rates to generate \$220,736,830 in additional revenues. The Company proposes to transfer \$81,908,027 recovered through the Gas System Enhancement Program ("GSEP") to base distribution rates, effective October 1, 2021. Because there is a delay in recovery through the GSEP, however, the Company proposes to not fully recover the remaining balance in the GSEP until May 1, 2022. Based on these GSEP-related proposals, the proposed overall increase to distribution revenues is \$138,828,803, which the Company states represents an 18.1 percent incremental increase in distribution revenue.

The Company also proposes to implement a performance-based ratemaking ("PBR") mechanism that would allow National Grid to adjust its base distribution rates on an annual basis through the application of a revenue-cap formula and to put in place a set of metrics to evaluate the Company's performance. The Company proposes to implement the PBR plan for five years with the possibility for extension. Additionally, National Grid's filing contains four demonstration programs that the Company states are intended to further the Commonwealth's greenhouse gas emissions goals. Additional information regarding these and all other proposals can be found in the Company's filing.

In <u>Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company</u>, D.P.U. 19-69 (2019), the Department approved the consolidation of Boston Gas and Colonial Gas Company ("Colonial Gas"). In the instant filing, National Grid proposes to combine the revenue requirement for the two companies, although Boston Gas and Colonial Gas will continue to maintain separate rates.

National Grid states that if its petition is approved as requested, the proposed revenue increase will have the following effects from November 1, 2021, through April 30, 2022:

# For Boston Gas Customers, the Company states:

- a typical residential non-heating customer using 94 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$16.55, or 6.2 percent;
- a typical residential heating customer using 871 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$122.49, or nine percent; and
- Most commercial and industrial ("C&I") customers will experience annual increases in the range of one
  percent to 13.4 percent, depending on their rate classification and level of therm usage.

# For Former Colonial Gas Customers, the Company states:

- a typical residential non-heating customer using 76 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$30.39, or 14.4 percent;
- a typical residential heating customer using 795 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$106.50, or 9.5 percent; and
- C&I customers will experience annual increases in the range of 8.6 percent to 39.8 percent, depending on their rate classification and level of therm usage.

The Company states that the estimated recovery of the remaining balance in the GSEP on May 1, 2022, would reduce the bill increases customers experience after the Company's proposed rates change on November 1, 2021, depending upon their rate classification and usage. In addition, bill impacts for C&I customers will vary depending upon their rate classification and level of usage. For specific impacts, please contact the Company as indicated below.

The Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts ("Attorney General") has filed a notice of intervention in this matter pursuant to G.L. c. 12, § 11E. Further, pursuant to G.L. c. 12, § 11E(b), the Attorney General has filed a notice of retention of experts and consultants to assist in her investigation of the Company's filing, and has requested Department approval to spend up to \$550,000 in this regard. Pursuant to G.L. c. 12, § 11E(b), the costs incurred by the Attorney General relative to her retention of experts and consultants may be recovered in the Company's rates.

Due to the COVID-19 state of emergency issued by Governor Baker on March 10, 2020, and certain ongoing restrictions and safety measures relating to in person events, the Department will conduct two virtual public hearings to receive comments on the Company's petition. The Department will conduct the hearings using Zoom videoconferencing on **January 26, 2021**, **beginning at 6:00 p.m. and January 28, 2021**, **beginning at 10:00 a.m.** Attendees can join the January 26, 2021 hearing by entering the link, <u>https://zoom.us/j/98694278163</u>, from a computer, smartphone, or tablet. The Department also will accept written comments on the Company's petition. Any person interested in commenting on this matter may submit written comments no later than the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on **January 29**, **2021**. At this time, all filings must be submitted only in electronic format in recognition of the difficulty that parties and the Department may have filing and receiving original copies because of the ongoing state of emergency (please see further filing instructions below).

Any person who desires to participate in the evidentiary phase of this proceeding shall file a petition for leave to intervene no later than 5:00 p.m. on **December 18, 2020**. A petition for leave to intervene must satisfy the timing and substantive requirements of 220 CMR 1.03. Receipt by the Department, not mailing, constitutes filing and determines whether a petition has been timely filed. A petition filed late may be disallowed as untimely, unless good cause is shown for waiver under 220 CMR 1.01(4). To be allowed, a petition under 220 CMR 1.03(1) must satisfy the standing requirements of G.L. c. 30A, § 10. All responses to petitions to intervene must be filed by the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on the second business day after the petition to intervene was filed.

Any person who seeks to intervene in this matter and also desires to comment on the Attorney General's notice of retention of experts and consultants must file the comments no later than the close of business (5:00 p.m.) on **December 18, 2020**.

Due to the ongoing state of emergency, the Department will conduct a virtual procedural conference in this matter on **January 7, 2021 at 2:00 p.m.** The Department will contact the parties under separate cover with instructions on how to attend the procedural conference.

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

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# Olympic champion, 'extraordinary' man

# Rafer Johnson, gold medalist and humanitarian, dies at 86

LOS ANGELES – Rafer Johnson, who won the decathlon at the 1960 Rome Olympics and helped subdue Robert F. Kennedy's assassin in 1968, died Wednesday. He was 86.

He died at his home in the Sherman Oaks section of Los Angeles, according to family friend Michael Roth. No cause of death was announced.

Johnson was among the world's greatest athletes from 1955 through his Olympic triumph in 1960, winning a national decathlon championship in 1956 and a silver medal at the Melbourne Olympics that same year.

His Olympic career included carrying the U.S. flag at the 1960 Games and lighting the torch at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum to open the 1984 Games. Johnson set world records in the decathlon three different times amid a fierce rivalry with his UCLA teammate C.K. Yang of Taiwan and Vasily Kuznetsov of the former Soviet Union.

Johnson won a gold medal at the Pan American Games in 1955 while competing in just his fourth decathlon. At a welcome home meet afterward in Kingsburg, California, he set his first world record, breaking the mark of two-time Olympic champion and his childhood hero Bob Mathias.

On June 5, 1968, Johnson was working on Kennedy's presidential campaign when the Democratic candidate was shot in the kitchen of the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles. Johnson joined former NFL star Rosey Grier and journalist George Plimpton in apprehending Sirhan Sirhan moments after he shot Kennedy, who died the next day.

"I knew he did everything he could to take care of Uncle Bobby at his most vulnerable moment," Kennedy's niece, Maria Shriver, said by phone. "His devotion to Uncle Bobby was pure and real. He had protected his friend. Even after Uncle Bobby's death he stayed close."

Johnson later called the assassination "one of the most devastating moments in my life."

Born Rafer Lewis Johnson on

Aug. 18, 1934, in Hillsboro, Texas, he moved to California in 1945 with his family, including his brother Jim, a future NFL Hall of Fame inductee. Although some sources cite Johnson's birth year as 1935, the family has said that is incorrect.

They eventually settled in Kingsburg, near Fresno in the San Joaquin Valley. It was less than 25 miles from Tulare, the hometown of Mathias, who would win the decathlon at the 1948 and 1952 Olympics and prove an early inspiration to Johnson.


Johnson was a standout student and played football, basketball, baseball and track and field at Kingsburg Joint Union High. At 6-foot-3 and 200-plus pounds, he looked more like a linebacker than a track and field athlete.

During his junior year of high school, Johnson's coach took him to Tulare to watch Mathias compete in a decathlon, an experience Johnson later said spurred him to take up the grueling 10-event sport.

As a freshman at UCLA, where he received academic and athletic scholarships, Johnson won gold at the the 1955 Pan Am Games, and set a world record of 7,985 points.

After winning the national decathlon championship in 1956, Johnson was the favorite for the Olympics

in Melbourne, but pulled a stomach muscle and strained a knee while training. He was forced to withdraw from the long jump, for which he had also qualified, but tried to gut out the decathlon.

Johnson's teammate Milt Campbell, a virtual unknown, gave the performance of his life, finishing with 7,937 points to win gold, 350 ahead of Johnson.

It was the last time Johnson would ever come in second. had their way with the record books between the 1956 and 1960 Olympics.

Kuznetzov, a two-time Olympic bronze medalist who the Soviets called their "man of steel," broke Johnson's world record in May 1958 with 8,016 points.

Later that year at a U.S.-Soviet dual meet in Moscow, Johnson beat Kuznetzov by 405 points and reclaimed the world record with 8,302 points. Johnson won over the Soviet audience with his gutsy performance in front of what had been a hostile crowd.

A car accident and subsequent back injury kept Johnson out of competition during 1959, but he was healthy again for the Olympics in 1960.

Yang was his primary competition in Rome. Yang won six of the first nine events, but Johnson led by 66 points going into the 1,500 meters, the decathlon's final event.

Johnson had to finish within 10 seconds of Yang, which was no small feat as Yang was much stronger running at distance than Johnson.

Johnson finished just 1.2 seconds and six yards behind Yang to win the gold. Yang earned silver and Kuznetsov took bronze.

At UCLA, Johnson played basketball for coach John Wooden, becoming a starter on the 1958-59 team. In 1958, he was elected student body president, the third Black to hold the office in school history.

"He stood for what he believed in and he did it in a very classy way with grace and dignity," Olympic champion swimmer Janet Evans said by phone.

Evans last saw Johnson, who attended her 2004 wedding, at a luncheon in his honor in May 2019.

"We were all there to fete him and he just didn't want to be in the spotlight," she said. "That was one of the things I loved about him. He didn't want credit."

Johnson retired from competition after the Rome Olympics. He began acting in movies, including appearances in "Wild in the Country" with Elvis Presley, "None But the Brave" with Frank Sinatra and the 1989 James Bond film "License to Kill." He worked briefly as a TV sportscaster before becoming a vice president at Continental Telephone in 1971.

In 1984 Johnson lit the Olympic

flame for the Los Angeles Games. He took the torch from Gina Hemphill, granddaughter of Olympic great Jesse Owens, who ran it into the Coliseum.

"Standing there and looking out, I remember thinking 'I wish I had a camera,'" Johnson said. "My hair was standing straight up on my arm. Words really seem inadequate."

Throughout his life, Johnson was widely known for his humanitarian efforts.

He served on the organizing committee of the first Special Olympics in Chicago in 1968, working with founder Eunice Kennedy Shriver. Johnson founded California Special Olympics the following year at a time when positive role models for the intellectually and physically disabled were rare.

"Rafer really paved the path for many of us to understand the responsibilities that come with being a successful athlete and the number of lives you can impact and change," Evans said.

Maria Shriver recalled meeting Johnson for the first time at age 10 or 11 through her mother, Eunice.

"He and I joked that I've been in love with him ever since," she said. "He really was an extraordinary man, such a loving, gracious, elegant, humble man who handled his success in such a beautiful way and stayed so true to himself throughout his life."

Peter Ueberroth, who chose Johnson to light the Olympic torch in 1984, called him "just one great person, a marvelous human being."

Johnson worked for the Peace Corps, March of Dimes, Muscular Dystrophy Association and American Red Cross. In 2016, he received the UCLA Medal, the university's highest award for extraordinary accomplishments. The school's track is named for Johnson and his wife, Betsy.

His children, Jenny Johnson Jordan and Josh Johnson, were athletes themselves.

Jenny was a beach volleyball player who competed in the 2000 Sydney Olympics and is on the coaching staff of UCLA's beach volleyball team. Josh competed in javelin at UCLA, where he was an All-American.

Besides his wife of 49 years and children, he is survived by sonin-law Kevin Jordan and four grandchildren.

Petition of Boston Gas Company, doing business as National Grid, pursuant to G.L. c. 164, § 94 and 220 CMR 5.00, for Approval of a General Increase in Base Distribution Rates for Gas Service and a Performance Based Ratemaking Plan.

On November 13, 2020, Boston Gas Company ("Boston Gas"), doing business as National Grid ("National Grid" or "Company"), filed a petition with the Department of Public Utilities ("Department") for an increase in gas distribution rates. The Department has docketed this matter as D.PU. 20-120 and has suspended the effective date of the proposed rate increase until October 1, 2021, to investigate the propriety of the Company's request. The Company represents that it will implement any change in rates beginning November 1, 2021. The Company was last granted an increase in distribution rates in <u>Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company</u>, D.PU. 17-170 (2018).

National Grid seeks to increase its rates to generate \$220,736,830 in additional revenues. The Company proposes to transfer \$81,908,027 recovered through the Gas System Enhancement Program ("GSEP") to base distribution rates, effective October 1, 2021. Because there is a delay in recovery through the GSEP, however, the Company proposes to not fully recover the remaining balance in the GSEP until May 1, 2022. Based on these GSEP-related proposals, the proposed overall increase to distribution revenues is \$138,828,803, which the Company states represents an 18.1 percent incremental increase in distribution revenue.

The Company also proposes to implement a performance-based ratemaking ("PBR") mechanism that would allow National Grid to adjust its base distribution rates on an annual basis through the application of a revenue-cap formula and to put in place a set of metrics to evaluate the Company's performance. The Company proposes to implement the PBR plan for five years with the possibility for extension. Additionally, National Grid's filing contains four demonstration programs that the Company states are intended to further the Commonwealth's greenhouse gas emissions goals. Additional information regarding these and all other proposals can be found in the Company's filing.

In <u>Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company</u>, D.P.U. 19-69 (2019), the Department approved the consolidation of Boston Gas and Colonial Gas Company ("Colonial Gas"). In the instant filing, National Grid proposes to combine the revenue requirement for the two companies, although Boston Gas and Colonial Gas will continue to maintain separate rates.

National Grid states that if its petition is approved as requested, the proposed revenue increase will have the following effects from November 1, 2021, through April 30, 2022:

For Boston Gas Customers, the Company states:

- a typical residential non-heating customer using 94 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$16.55, or 6.2 percent;
- a typical residential heating customer using 871 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$122.49, or nine percent; and
- Most commercial and industrial ("C&I") customers will experience annual increases in the range of one percent to 13.4 percent, depending on their rate classification and level of therm usage.
- For Former Colonial Gas Customers, the Company states:
- a typical residential non-heating customer using 76 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$30.39, or 14.4 percent;
- a typical residential heating customer using 795 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$106.50, or 9.5 percent; and
- C&I customers will experience annual increases in the range of 8.6 percent to 39.8 percent, depending on their rate classification and level of therm usage.

The Company states that the estimated recovery of the remaining balance in the GSEP on May 1, 2022, would reduce the bill increases customers experience after the Company's proposed rates change on November 1, 2021, depending upon their rate classification and usage. In addition, bill impacts for C&I customers will vary depending upon their rate classification and level of usage. For specific impacts, please contact the Company as indicated below.

# Derry man formerly accused of killing wife dies at state facility

DERRY — Roderick Munstis, 81, formerly of Derry, died recently at Glencliff Home for the Elderly, three months after he was admitted to the state facility following a superior court decision to drop murder charges against him because he was deemed unfit to stand trial.

According to a single-line obituary published online, Munstis died Friday, Nov. 20.

# Ex-French leader Giscard d'Estaing dies at 94

PARIS - Valery Giscard d'Estaing, the president of France from 1974 to 1981 who became a champion of European integration, died on Wednesday. He was 94.

Giscard d'Estaing's office said he passed away in his family home in the Loir-et-Cher region, in central France, after contracting COVID-19.

"In accordance with his wishes, his funeral will take place in strict privacy," his office said.

Giscard d'Estaing was hospitalized last month with heart problems, but remained vigorous deep into old age.

In a January 2020 interview with The Associated Press, he displayed a firm handshake and sharp eye, recounting details from his meetings as French president in the 1970s with then-U.S. President Jimmy Carter and then-Egyptian leader Anwar Sadat, whose photos graced his office walls.

He wrote the article in the EU charter that allowed Brexit to happen – the brief measure that allows a member state to leave the bloc.

On the eve of Britain's departure this year, Giscard told AP it was a "step backward" geopolitically, but took the long view. "We functioned without Britain during the first years of the European Union ... So we will rediscover a situation that we have already known.'

mutual consent were legalized under his term, and he reduced the age of majority from 21 to 18.

He played his accordion in working class neighborhoods. One Christmas morning, he invited four passing garbage men to breakfast at the presidential palace.

He lost his re-election bid in 1981 to Socialist Francois Mitterrand.

Born in 1926 in Coblenz, Germany, where his father was a financial director of the post-World War I French occupation administration, he grew up with a pan-European view. After joining the French Resistance during World War

II, he next saw Germany as a tank commander in the French military in 1944.

In 1952, he married Anne-AymoneIt de Brantes, the daughter of a count and heiress to a steel fortune. They had four children: Valerie-Anne, Louis, Henri and Jacinte.

Young Giscard d'Estaing studied at the prestigious Polytechnical Institute and then the elite National School of Administration, before mastering economics at Oxford.

President Charles de Gaulle named him finance minister at the age of 36.

After his defeat in the 1981 presidential election, he temporarily retired from politics. He then found a second calling in the European Union. He

Petition of Boston Gas Company, doing business as National Grid, pursuant to G.L. c. 164, § 94 and 220 CMR 5.00, for Approval of a General Increase in Base Distribution Rates for Gas Service and a Performance-Based Ratemaking Plan.

On November 13, 2020, Boston Gas Company ("Boston Gas"), doing business as National Grid ("National Grid" or "Company"), filed a petition with the Department of Public Utilities ("Department") for an increase in gas distribution rates. The Department has docketed this matter as D.P.U. 20-120 and has suspended the effective date of the proposed rate increase until October 1, 2021, to investigate the propriety of the Company's request. The Company represents that it will implement any change in rates beginning November 1, 2021. The Company was last granted an increase in distribution rates in Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company, D.P.U. 17-170 (2018).

National Grid seeks to increase its rates to generate \$220,736,830 in additional revenues. The Company proposes to transfer \$81,908,027 recovered through the Gas System Enhancement Program ("GSEP") to base distribution rates, effective October 1 2021. Because there is a delay in recovery through the GSEP, however, the Company proposes to not fully recover the remaining balance in the GSEP until May 1, 2022. Based on these GSEP-related proposals, the proposed overall increase to distribution revenues is \$138,828,803, which the Company states represents an 18.1 percent incremental increase in distribution revenue.

The Company also proposes to implement a performance-based ratemaking ("PBR") mechanism that would allow National Grid to adjust its base distribution rates on an annual basis through the application of a revenue-cap formula and to put in place a set of metrics to evaluate the Company's performance. The Company proposes to implement the PBR plan for five years with the possibility for extension. Additionally, National Grid's filing contains four demonstration programs that the Company states are intended to further the Commonwealth's greenhouse gas emissions goals. Additional information regarding these and all other proposals can be found in the Company's filing.

In Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company, D.P.U. 19-69 (2019), the Department approved the consolidation of Boston Gas and Colonial Gas Company ("Colonial Gas"). Petition of Boston Gas Company, doing business as National Grid, pursuant to G.L. c. 164, § 94 and 220 CMR 5.00, for Approval of a General Increase in Base Distribution Rates for Gas Service and a Performance-Based Ratemaking Plan.

On November 13, 2020, Boston Gas Company ("Boston Gas"), doing business as National Grid ("National Grid" or "Company"), filed a petition with the Department of Public Utilities ("Department") for an increase in gas distribution rates. The Department has docketed this matter as D.P.U. 20-120 and has suspended the effective date of the proposed rate increase until October 1, 2021, to investigate the propriety of the Company's request. The Company represents that it will implement any change in rates beginning November 1, 2021. The Company was last granted an increase in distribution rates in Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company, D.P.U. 17-170 (2018).

National Grid seeks to increase its rates to generate \$220,736,830 in additional revenues. The Company proposes to transfer \$81,908,027 recovered through the Gas System Enhancement Program ("GSEP") to base distribution rates, effective October 1, 2021. Because there is a delay in recovery through the GSEP, however, the Company proposes to not fully recover the remaining balance in the GSEP until May 1, 2022. Based on these GSEP-related proposals, the proposed overall increase to distribution revenues is \$138,828,803, which the Company states represents an 18.1 percent incremental increase in distribution revenue.

The Company also proposes to implement a performance-based ratemaking ("PBR") mechanism that would allow National Grid to adjust its base distribution rates on an annual basis through the application of a revenue-cap formula and to put in place a set of metrics to evaluate the Company's performance. The Company proposes to implement the PBR plan for five years with the possibility for extension. Additionally, National Grid's filing contains four demonstration programs that the Company states are intended to further the Commonwealth's greenhouse gas emissions goals. Additional information regarding these and all other proposals can be found in the Company's filing.

In Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company, D.P.U. 19-69 (2019), the Department approved the consolidation of Boston Gas and Colonial Gas Company ("Colonial Gas"). In the instant filing, National Grid proposes to combine the revenue requirement for the two companies, although Boston Gas and Colonial Gas will continue to maintain separate rates.

National Grid states that if its petition is approved as requested, the proposed revenue increase will have the following effects from November 1, 2021, through April 30, 2022:

# For Boston Gas Customers, the Company states:

- a typical residential non-heating customer using 94 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$16.55, or 6.2 percent;
- a typical residential heating customer using 871 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$122.49, or nine percent; and
- Most commercial and industrial ("C&I") customers will experience annual increases in the range of one percent to 13.4 percent, depending on their rate classification and level of therm usage.

# For Former Colonial Gas Customers, the Company states:

- a typical residential non-heating customer using 76 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$30.39, or 14.4 percent;
- a typical residential heating customer using 795 therms per year will experience an annual bill increase of \$106.50, or 9.5 percent; and
- C&I customers will experience annual increases in the range of 8.6 percent to 39.8 percent, depending on their rate classification and level of therm usage.

The Company states that the estimated recovery of the remaining balance in the GSEP on May 1, 2022, would reduce the bill increases customers experience after the Company's proposed rates change on November 1, 2021, depending upon their rate classification and usage. In addition, bill impacts for C&I customers will vary depending upon their rate classification and level of usage. For specific impacts, please contact the Company as indicated below.

The Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts ("Attorney General") has filed a notice of intervention in this matter pursuant to G.L. c. 12, § 11E. Further, pursuant to G.L. c. 12, § 11E(b), the Attorney General has filed a notice of retention of experts and consultants to assist in her investigation of the Company's filing, and has requested Department approval to spend up to \$550,000 in this regard. Pursuant to G.L. c. 12, § 11E(b), the costs incurred by the Attorney General relative to her retention of experts and consultants may be recovered in the Company's rates.

Due to the COVID-19 state of emergency issued by Governor Baker on March 10, 2020, and certain ongoing restrictions and safety measures relating to inperson events, the Department will conduct two virtual public hearings to receive comments on the Company's petition. Stars return to inauguration, with J. Lo, Gaga set to perform

The A-list is back. How A-list? Try Lady Gaga and J. Lo.

Inauguration officials have announced that the glittery duo will appear in person on Jan. 20, with Gaga singing the national anthem as Joe Biden and Kamala Harris are sworn in on the West Front of the U.S. Capitol and Jennifer Lopez giving a musical performance.

Foo Fighters, John Legend and Bruce Springsteen will offer remote performances, and Eva Longoria and Kerry Washington will introduce segments of the event.

Later that day, Tom Hanks will host a 90-minute primetime TV special celebrating Biden's inauguration. Other performers include Justin Timberlake, Jon Bon Jovi, Demi Lovato and Ant Clemons.

Despite a raging pandemic that is forcing most inaugural events online, it was a sign that Hollywood was back and eager to embrace the new president-elect four years after many big names stayed away from the inauguration of President Donald Trump, hugely unpopular in Hollywood.

The question: How would the star wattage play across the country as Biden seeks to tend to get country music



unite a bruised nation? Eric Dezenhall, a Washington crisis management consultant and former Reagan administration official, predicted reaction would fall "along tribal lines.'

"I think it all comes down to the reinforcement of preexisting beliefs," Dezenhall said. "If you're a Biden supporter, it's nice to see Lady Gaga perform." But, he added, "what rallied Trump supporters was the notion of an uberelite that had nothing to do at all with them and that they couldn't relate to.'

Presidential historian Tevi Troy quipped that the starry Gaga-J. Lo lineup was not A-list, but D-list — "for Democratic."

"When Democrats win, you get the more standard celebrities," said Troy, author of "What Jefferson Read, Ike Watched and Obama Tweeted: 200 Years of Popular Culture in the White House."

"With Republicans, you

stars and race-car drivers." Referring to Lady Gaga's outspoken support for the Biden-Harris ticket, he said he was nostalgic for the days when celebrities were not so political.

"Call me a hopeless romantic, but I liked the old days when Bob Hope or Frank Sinatra would come to these events and they were not overtly political," he said.

Still, he said, Biden's unity message won't be derailed. "In the end, I don't think

having Lady Gaga or J. Lo is all that divisive," he said.

Attendance at the inauguration will be severely limited, due to both the pandemic and fears of continued violence, following last week's storming of the Capitol.

Outside the official events. one of the more prominent galas each inauguration is The Creative Coalition's quadrennial ball, a benefit for arts education. This year, the ball is entirely virtual.



allow National Grid to adjust its base distribution rates on an annual basis through the application of a revenue-cap formula and to put in place a set of metrics to evaluate the Company's performance. The Company proposes to implement the PBR plan for five years with the possibility for extension. Additionally, National Grid's filing contains four demonstration programs that the Company states are intended to further the Commonwealth's greenhouse gas emissions goals. Petition of Boston Gas Company, doing business as National Grid, pursuant to G.L. c. 164, § 94 and 220 CMR 5.00, for Approval of a General Increase in Base Distribution Rates for Gas Service and a Performance-Based Ratemaking Plan.

On November 13, 2020, Boston Gas Company ("Boston Gas"), doing business as National Grid ("National Grid" or "Company"), filed a petition with the Department of Public Utilities ("Department") for an increase in gas distribution rates. The Department has docketed this matter as D.P.U. 20-120 and has suspended the effective date of the proposed rate increase until October 1, 2021, to investigate the propriety of the Company's request. The Company represents that it will implement any change in rates beginning November 1, 2021. The Company was last granted an increase in distribution rates in Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company, D.P.U. 17-170 (2018).

National Grid seeks to increase its rates to generate \$220,736,830 in additional revenues. The Company proposes to transfer \$81,908,027 recovered through the Gas System Enhancement Program ("GSEP") to base distribution rates, effective October 1, 2021. Because there is a delay in recovery through the GSEP, however, the Company proposes to not fully recover the remaining balance in the GSEP until May 1, 2022. Based on these GSEP-related proposals, the proposed overall increase to distribution revenues is \$138,828,803, which the Company states represents an 18.1 percent incremental increase in distribution revenue.

The Company also proposes to implement a performance-based ratemaking ("PBR") mechanism that would allow National Grid to adjust its base distribution rates on an annual basis through the application of a revenue-cap formula and to put in place a set of metrics to evaluate the Company's performance. The Company proposes to implement the PBR plan for five years with the possibility for extension. Additionally, National Grid's filing contains four demonstration programs that the Company states are intended to further the Commonwealth's greenhouse gas emissions goals. Additional information regarding these and all other proposals can be found in the Company's filing.

In Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company, D.P.U. 19-69 (2019), the Department approved the consolidation of Boston Gas and Colonial Gas Company ("Colonial Gas"). In the instant filing, National Grid proposes to combine the revenue requirement for the two companies, although Boston Gas and Colonial Gas will continue to maintain separate rates.

National Grid states that if its petition is approved as requested, the proposed revenue increase will have the following effects from November 1, 2021, through April 30, 2022:

GENEVA — The World Health Organization chief Monday lambasted on drugmakers' profits and vaccine inequalities, saying it's "not right" that younger, healthier adults in wealthy countries get vaccinated against COVID-19 before older people or health care workers in poorer countries and charging that most vaccine makers have targeted locations where "profits are highest."

Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus kicked off the WHO's week-long executive board meeting — virtually from its headquarters in Geneva — by lamenting that one poor country received a mere 25 vaccine doses while over 39 million doses have been administered in nearly 50 richer nations.

"Just 25 doses have been given in one lowest income country — not 25 million, not 25,000 — just 25. I need to be blunt: The world is on the brink of a catastrophic moral failure," Tedros said. He did not specify the country, but a WHO spokeswoman identified it as Guinea.

"It's right that all governments want to prioritize vaccinating their own health workers and older people first," he said. "But it's not right that younger, healthier adults in rich countries are vaccinated before health workers and older people in poorer countries. There will be enough vaccine for everyone."

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

JERUSALEM — After sprinting ahead in the race to inoculate its population against the coronavirus, Israel has struck a deal with Pfizer, promising to share vast troves of medical data with the international drug giant in exchange for the continued flow of its hard-to-get vaccine.

Proponents say the deal could allow Israel to become the first country to vaccinate most of its population, while providing valuable research that could help the rest of the world. But critics say the deal raises major ethical concerns, including possible privacy violations and a deepening of the global divide that enables wealthy countries to stockpile vaccines as poorer populations, including Palestinians in the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza, have to wait longer to be inoculated.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu — who is stumping ahead of the country's March elections as Israel's vaccinator-in-chief — said earlier this month that he reached the deal with Pfizer's chief executive to

This centralized system has helped Israel administer more than 2 million doses of the vaccine in under a month. Israel has also purchased doses of the Moderna and Astra-Zeneca vaccines.

The inoculation blitz is a matter of national pride. It also is at the center of Netanyahu's reelection campaign as he seeks to deflect attention from his ongoing corruption trial, Israel's deep economic crisis and the latest virus surge.

The Health Ministry has recorded over 551,000 cases since the beginning of the pandemic and more than 4,000 deaths. Israeli officials say they aim to have most of the country vaccinated by the end of March, just around election day.

But the exact quid pro quo between Israel and Pfizer is unclear, even after a redacted version of the agreement was released by the Israeli Health Ministry on Sunday.

Neither Israel nor Pfizer would say how much Israel has paid for the vaccines, though Edelstein called it a "classical win-win" for both sides. Israeli media have reported that Israel paid at least 50 percent more than other countries. The data is reportedly being shared with the World Health Organization, but the global body did not respond to repeated requests for comment.

Earlier this month, the head of the WHO appealed to drugmakers and wealthier countries to "stop making bilateral deals," saying they hurt a U.N.-backed effort to widen access. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus did not single out any countries or companies.

# **China economy grew** in 2020 as rebound from virus accelerated

BEIJING - China eked out 2.3 percent economic growth in 2020, likely becoming the only major economy to expand as shops and factories reopened relatively early from a shutdown to fight the coronavirus while the United States, Japan and Europe struggled with rising infections.

Growth in the three months ending in December rose to 6.5 percent over a year earlier as consumers returned to shopping malls, restaurants and cinemas, official data showed Monday. That was up from the previous quarter's 4.9 percent and stronger than many forecasters expected.

In early 2020, activity contracted by 6.8 percent in the first quarter as the ruling Communist Party took the thenunprecedented step of shutting down most of its economy to fight the virus. The following quarter, China became the first major country to grow again with a 3.2 percent expansion after the party declared victory over the virus in March and allowed factories, shops and offices to reopen.

# Authorities: Man lived inside Chicago airport for 3 months

CHICAGO - A California man who police said claimed to be too afraid to fly due to COVID-19 hid out for three months in a secured area of O'Hare International Airport until his weekend arrest, prosecutors said Sunday.

Aditya Singh, 36, is charged with felony criminal trespass to a restricted area of an airport and misdemeanor theft.

In bond court Sunday, prosecutors said Singh arrived at O'Hare on a flight from Los Angeles on Oct. 19 and allegedly has lived in the airport's security zone ever since, without detection.

Cook County Judge Susana Ortiz reacted incredulously Sunday after a prosecutor detailed the allegations.

"So if I understand you correctly," Ortiz said, 'you're telling me that an unauthorized, nonemployee individual was allegedly living within a secure part of the O'Hare airport terminal from Oct. 19, 2020, to Jan. 16, 2021, and was not detected? I want to understand you correctly."

Early Saturday afternoon, two United Airlines employees approached Singh and asked to see his identification.

Assistant State's Attorney Kathleen Hagerty said Singh lowered his face mask and showed them an airport ID badge that he was wearing around his neck.

The badge actually belonged to an operations manager who had reported it missing Oct. 26. The two United Airlines employees called 911. Police took Singh into custody Saturday morning in Terminal 2 near Gate F12. Hagerty said Singh reportedly found the badge in the airport and was scared to go home due to COVID. She told the judge other passengers were giving him food. Singh lives in the Los Angeles suburb of Orange with roommates and does not have a criminal background, according to Assistant Public Defender Courtney Smallwood. She said he has a master's degree in hospitality and is unemployed. Smallwood acknowledged the circumstances were unusual but noted the allegations were nonviolent. It was unclear what brought Singh to Chicago and if he has any ties to the area. As a condition of bail, Ortiz barred Singh from stepping foot in the airport again if he is able to post the \$1,000 he needs for his release. He is due back in court Jan. 27. "The court finds these facts and circumstances quite shocking for the alleged period of time that this occurred," the judge said. "Being in a secured part of the airport under a fake ID badge allegedly, based upon the need for airports to be absolutely secure so that people feel safe to travel, I do find those alleged actions do make him a danger to the community."

Domestic tourism is reviving, though authorities have urged the public to stay home during the Lunar New Year holiday in February, normally the busiest travel season, in response to a spate of new infections in some Chinese cities.

Exports have been boosted by demand for Chinese-made masks and other medical goods.

The growing momentum "reflected improving private consumption expenditure as well as buoyant net exports," said Rajiv Biswas of IHS Markit in a report. He said China is likely to be the only major economy to grow in 2020 while developed countries and most major emerging markets were in recession.

The economy "recovered

"it is too early to conclude that this is a full recovery," said Iris Pang of ING in a report. "External demand has not yet fully recovered. This is a big hurdle."

Exporters and high-tech manufacturers face uncertainty about how President-elect Joseph Biden will handle conflicts with Beijing over trade, technology and security. His predecessor, Donald Trump, hurt exporters by hiking tariffs on Chinese goods and manufacturers including telecom equipment giant Huawei by imposing curbs on access to U.S. components and technol-

"We expect the newly elected U.S. government will continue most of the current policies on China, at least for the first quarter," Pang said.

The International Monetary Fund and private sector forecasters expect economic growth to rise further this year to above 8 percent.

erage income will be lower.

Exports rose 3.6 percent last year despite the tariff war with Washington. Exporters took market share from foreign competitors that still faced anti-virus restrictions.

Retail spending contracted by 3.9 percent over 2019 but gained 4.6 percent in December over a year earlier as demand revived. Consumer spending recovered to above the previous year's levels in the quarter ending in September.

Online sales of consumer goods rose 14.8 percent as millions of families who were ordered to stay home shifted to buying groceries and clothing on the internet.

Factory output rose 2.8 percent over 2019. Activity accelerated toward the end of the year. Production rose 7.3 percent in December.

Despite travel controls imposed for some areas after new cases flared this month most of the country is unaffected.

# **Parler website back online** with 'lovers and haters' note

The website for Parler, the social media app popular with right-wing groups, returned to the internet Sunday afternoon with a message for the company's lovers and haters.

Now seems like the right time to remind you all – both lovers and haters - why we started this platform," the message reads. "We believe privacy is paramount and free speech essential, especially on social media. Our aim has

always been to provide a nonpartisan public square where individuals can enjoy and exercise their rights to both. We will resolve any challenge before us and plan to welcome all of you back soon. We will not let civil discourse perish!"

Parler, which refers to itself as a free speech alternative to Twitter, was booted out of the Apple App Store and the Google Play store and kicked off of Amazon Web Services last week after the Jan. 6 Capitol riot in Washington, D.C.

According to CNN, Parler

is now hosted by Epik, which supports Gab and 8chan, which are popular among farright groups because of their lax moderation standards.

Parler filed an anti-trust lawsuit against Amazon last week after AWS cut off Parler's service, but Amazon fired back, defending its decision because Parler had shown an unwillingness and inability to remove violent content.

Several Parler users encouraged bloodshed during the D.C. riot.

Americans are in the thrall of this. They don't realize they are fascists, and that is the greatest problem."

It's what happened in Europe and led to World War II, said Whalen, who pointed out that both Benito Mussolini and Adolf Hitler started out as elected officials promising reform.

Probably the most distressing thing Whalen hears is people saying, "This is not us. This is not who we are' as a country."

"This is who we are," he said. "Our Founding Fathers would be horrified."

While groups such as Lange's say they went to Washington to peacefully exercise their protected rights of assembly and freedom of speech, the postings on their social media pages are replete with conservative conspiracy podcasts that spread false claims of election fraud, and ominous warnings and calls to action just prior to the assault on the Capitol. On Jan. 6, a featured podcast on Lange's website warned that "Trump and the Patriots, they are moving forward with their plan," and that it was about 'taking back the country."

Experts in terrorism and political movements see something else in pro-Trump groups such as Lange's with their military props and language, espousing patriotism and law and order while claiming to be truth-tellers.

"It has all the trappings of fascism," Whalen said. "You claim to have a monopoly on the truth, that you're either for us or against us, and that the democratic process is standing in our way, taking our freedoms away."

# 'We don't have faith in our institutions'

The attack on the Capitol, experts say, was only possible with the support of grass-roots activists and conservative politicians, both national and local, who couldn't or wouldn't recognize that Biden had won in a free and fair election. The lie that the election was stolen, advanced by Trump and repeated down to the level of groups like Lange's and even elected Cape Cod Republicans, is anti-democratic, these

respect this tenet of democracy, democracy is in danger." Hundreds of thousands rallied in Washington on Jan. 6 under the banner of a stolen election, despite overwhelming evidence to the contrary, including 59 failed lawsuits, numerous recounts of ballots in battleground states and the assertion by both Republican and Democratic election officials and governors and former U.S. Attorney General William Barr that there was no widespread fraud.

Lange, who was not in Washington on Jan. 6, said he did not support the storming of the Capitol and told Fox 25 News that he "thinks all political violence is unacceptable."

But then, why the military vehicle, why the machine gun? "In this day and ago, it's

"In this day and age, it's pro-law and order and promilitary," Lange said. "We have an antique truck as part of the brand, and if you're offended by an antique military truck, there's probably other things you'll have an issue with."

But the messages on caps, T-shirts and sweatshirts sold online and visible inside the Capitol building during the assault and at the demonstration were not pro-law and order, and were not peaceful. Photographs and videos from the rally and the attack showed people wearing "MAGA Civil War Jan. 6, 2021" T-shirts, Camp Auschwitz and Q-Anon hoodies, and flags and T-shirts of white supremacist and far-right groups. One rioter carried a Confederate flag into the Capitol, which had never happened before.

These are groups that are aligned with Trump and have been supported by him, said American University professor Cynthia Miller-Idriss, speaking on PBS News Hour last week. She said social media and the actions of Trump have helped mainstream and normalize extremist ideas, legitimizing far-right extremists.

"(W)hat we're seeing now is the very people — not just the president, but other elected officials — who are supposed to be trusted sources of information, helping to create and propagate a disinformation landscape that says this election is invalid, that there's been a massive voter fraud, and really compelling these people to act," Miller-Idriss

said

constitutional process was followed. Cape and Islands District Attorney Michael O'Keefe also dodged the question, but went further, saying he thinks there was significant voter fraud and that courts had refused to hear lawsuits because they didn't want to get involved in politics.

"They took this COVID-19 issue and made it an excuse to have these mass mail-in ballots," O'Keefe said.

"I would say this is stunning," said state Sen. Julian Cyr, a Democrat. "Cape Cod and the Islands have a longstanding history of bipartisan politics that respects the rule of law and gets things done. It is deeply worrisome to me that any elected official in the region would perpetrate such false and seditious information."

Cyr said Massachusetts Republicans are afraid of the radical minority element of their base, but need to think long and hard about continuing to perpetuate these lies.

"People have already been killed," he said. "To actively embrace these seditionist lies is not who we are on Cape Cod."


Republican political consultant Rob Gray said Republicans in Massachusetts know that Trump has a small band of hardcore followers in the state.

"Since winning as a Republican in Massachusetts is very difficult anyway, alienating any voter is hard for them," Gray said.

That fear factor did not intimidate the state's top Republican.

"Gov. Charlie Baker has no problem saying it was a free and fair election and that President-elect Biden won. I think other elected Republicans would do well to agree with his take," said Gray, who served as an adviser to the presidential campaigns of former President George W. Bush and the late Sen. John McCain, as well as Baker's and former Gov. William Weld's campaigns.

Since more than half of Massachusetts voters are registered as unenrolled and don't declare affinity for either party, Gray said it's difficult for extremist candidates or those who back those points

thought police," he said. "The key is really to crush the participants in the violence in a legal way without harming those who were just political."

Extremism is a doubleedge sword. Violent acts can be a recruitment tool because people believe they are joining the baddest of the bad, Abrahms said. But violence can also repulse prospective recruits.

"My research shows that extremism tends to backfire by reducing support," Abrahms said, noting Trump lost popular and political support after the attack on the Capitol.

# Trump's approval rating declines

Trump is leaving office with a 29% job approval rating, the lowest of his presidency, according to a Pew Research Center poll published Jan. 15. He also was found to have increasingly negative ratings for his post-election behavior.

"Even his own loyal people

in Congress have turned against him," Abrahms said. "There is a reputational cost to the use of violence."

But that doesn't mean that right-wing extremism is going away. They will feel more aggrieved with a new president who isn't sympathetic to them, and with their access to social media terminated or greatly reduced, Abrahms said.

"They will reconvene elsewhere and will radicalize others," Abrahms said. "I think over the next four years we will see more right-wing extremism and incidents with a higher death toll than (on Jan. 6)."

Whalen says the problem with the Republican Party is that it embraced Trump and has become the authoritarian party. He says that as 2024 presidential candidates jostle for position, they will move to the extreme right to capture Trump voters.

"That means a major political party run by radicals. This would have nothing to do with democracy. They will want to end pluralism, and that's the end of democracy," he said.

Kadivar said the U.S. needs to fix problems in the American democratic process, such as the Electoral College and gerrymandering. It also needs to address divisive social issues such as institutionalized racism. The Republican Party, evangelical churches and community leaders have to take responsibility for what happened.

"I think this was a planned white supremacist attack (on the Capitol), incited and encouraged by Trump. He's been the leader of this mob," Kadivar said. "But there have been community leaders that supported this kind of thing. There's a lot of people jumping the sinking ship now, but they have enabled these past four years."

experts said, and needs to be refuted.

"We don't have faith in our institutions any longer," Lange said. "And we have little confidence in the election that was just administered." A lot of people feel that way."

A lot of people do have doubts about the election. According to a Reuters/ Ipsos poll, about half of all Republicans believe that Trump won and that the election was stolen from him by widespread voter fraud. (According to a Dec. 17, 2020, Gallup Poll, 25% of Americans identify as Republicans, 31% as Democrats and 41% as independent.) An online survey of 24,000 people in November by Northeastern, Harvard, Northwestern and Rutgers found that more than half of Republican voters either believe that Trump won, or aren't sure who won.

"By any measure, this was a fair election," Mohammad Ali Kadivar, an assistant professor of sociology and international studies at Boston College, said. "When you have a large group of people who don't In the hours following the attack, Republican Sens. Mitch McConnell and Lindsay Graham finally said that President-elect Joe Biden and Vice Presidentelect Kamala Harris had won the 2020 election, and both houses of Congress certified the Electoral College results early Jan. 7 after the count was interrupted when rioters invaded the Capitol the day before.

But national politics is a different animal, and Gray said Trump has led a lot of Republicans down a false path from which it will be hard to extricate themselves.

"The next four years depend on how Republicans react, not just to Trump ... but to this type of behavior," Kadivar said.

Max Abrahms, a Northeastern University professor of political science with a focus on terrorism, says there is a danger in a backlash that impinges on constitutionally protected rights. He draws the line between those who may harbor extremist political views and those who have become what he calls "tactically extreme" and favor violence to change the political status quo.

"I think this is a very important distinction for law enforcement to respect because we have First Amendment rights. They can't be in the business of being the

would happen on Sept. 15. Affordable housing and a community center were identified as the town's highest priority needs in the community survey, which was completed by 700 residents. But town officials criticized the consultant's report last week for its focus on single family affordable housing units.

Select Board member Mark Mathisen said the town needed more sophisticated designs for affordable housing, and that housing should come before any plans for building a community center.

"The key is having housing that young people, working people can afford to live in so they can be year round components of the community," he said.

Allan McClennen, chairman of the Affordable Housing Trust Board, said the town might want to put one building on the site to create efficiencies of scale. He suggested taking advantage of the 5.5 acres, rather than building single dwelling units that would take up more land area.

The cottage-style homes would be approximately 1,200 square feet. McClennen suggested the possibility of using three acres for housing and two acres for a community center. Zoning in the downtown district allows for 14 units per acre.

Select Board Chairman Kevin Galligan was disappointed that no family friendly play spaces were included in the two housing designs. He thought the design was simplistic, but that there were ways it could be enhanced.

Of the survey respondents, 70, or 10%, didn't think the town should purchase the property.



The Company was last granted an increase in distribution rates in Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company, D.P.U. 17-170 (2018).

National Grid seeks to increase its rates to generate \$220,736,830 in additional revenues. The Company proposes to transfer \$81,908,027 recovered through the Gas System Enhancement Program ("GSEP") to base distribution rates, effective October 1, 2021. Because there is a delay in recovery through the GSEP, however, the Company proposes to not fully recover the remaining balance in the GSEP until May 1, 2022. Based on these GSEP-related proposals, the proposed overall increase to distribution revenues is \$138,828,803, which the Company states represents an 18.1 percent incremental increase in distribution revenue.

The Company also proposes to implement a performance-based ratemaking ("PBR") mechanism that would allow National Grid to adjust its base distribution rates on an annual basis through the application of a revenue-cap formula and to put in place a set of metrics to evaluate the Company's performance. The Company proposes to implement the PBR plan for five years with the possibility for extension. Additionally, National Grid's filing contains four demonstration programs that the Company states are intended to further the Commonwealth's greenhouse gas emissions goals. Petición de Boston Gas Company, que opera como National Grid, de conformidad con G.L. c. 164, § 94 y 220 CMR 5.00, para la aprobación de un aumento general en las tarifas de distribución base para el servicio de gas y un plan tarifario basado en el desempeño.

El 13 de noviembre de 2020, Boston Gas Company ("Boston Gas"), que opera como National Grid ("National Grid" o "Compañía"), presentó una petición ante el Departamento de Servicios Públicos ("Departamento") para un aumento en tarifas de distribución de gas. El Departamento ha registrado este asunto como D.P.U. 20-120 y ha suspendido la fecha de vigencia del aumento de tarifas propuesto hasta el 1 de octubre de 2021, para investigar la idoneidad de la solicitud de la Compañía. La Compañía declara que implementará cualquier cambio en las tarifas a partir del 1 de noviembre de 2021. La última vez que la Compañía recibió un aumento en las tarifas de distribución fue en <u>Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas</u> <u>Company</u>, D.P.U. 17-170 (2018).

National Grid busca incrementar sus tarifas para generar \$220,736,830 en ingresos adicionales. La Compañía propone transferir \$81,908,027 recuperados a través del Programa de Mejora del Sistema de Gas ("GSEP") a las tarifas de distribución base, a partir del 1 de octubre de 2021. Debido a que hay un retraso en la recuperación a través del GSEP, sin embargo, la Compañía propone no recuperar completamente el saldo restante en el GSEP hasta el 1 de mayo de 2022. Con base en estas propuestas relacionadas con GSEP, el aumento general propuesto a los ingresos por distribución es de \$138,828,803, que según la Compañía representa un aumento incremental del 18.1 por ciento en los ingresos por distribución.

La Compañía también propone implementar un mecanismo de determinación de tarifas basado en el desempeño ("PBR") que permitiría a National Grid ajustar sus tarifas de distribución base anualmente mediante la aplicación de una fórmula de tope de ingresos y establecer un conjunto de métricas para evaluar el desempeño de la Compañía. La Compañía propone implementar el plan PBR por cinco años con posibilidad de extensión. Además, la presentación de National Grid contiene cuatro programas de demostración que, según afirma la Compañía, están destinados a promover los objetivos de emisiones de gases de efecto invernadero de la Commonwealth. Se puede encontrar información adicional sobre estas y todas las demás propuestas en la presentación de la Compañía.

En <u>Boston Gas Company/Colonial Gas Company</u>, D.P.U. 19-69 (2019), el Departamento aprobó la consolidación de Boston Gas y Colonial Gas Company ("Colonial Gas"). En la presentación actual, National Grid propone combinar el requisito de ingresos para las dos compañías, aunque Boston Gas y Colonial Gas continuarán manteniendo tarifas separadas.

National Grid establece que si su petición es aprobada según lo solicitado, el aumento de ingresos propuesto tendrá los siguientes efectos desde el 1 de noviembre de 2021 hasta el 30 de abril de 2022:

# Para los clientes de Boston Gas, la Compañía declara:

• un cliente residencial típico sin calefacción que usa 94 termias por año experimentará un aumento anual en la factura de \$16.55, o 6.2 por ciento;

• un cliente típico de calefacción residencial que usa 871 termias por año experimentará un aumento anual en la factura de \$122.49, o nueve por ciento; y

• la mayoría de los clientes comerciales e industriales ("C&I") experimentarán aumentos anuales en el rango de uno por ciento a 13.4 por ciento, dependiendo de su clasificación de tarifas y nivel de uso de termias.

# Para los clientes anteriores de Colonial Gas, la Compañía declara:

• un cliente residencial típico sin calefacción que usa 76 termias por año experimentará un aumento anual en la factura de \$30.39, o 14.4 por ciento;

• un cliente típico de calefacción residencial que usa 795 termias por año experimentará un aumento anual en la factura de \$106.50, o 9.5 por ciento; y

• los clientes de C&I experimentarán aumentos anuales en el rango del 8.6 por ciento al 39.8 por ciento, dependiendo de su clasificación de tarifas y el nivel de uso de termias.

La Compañía declara que la recuperación estimada del saldo restante en el GSEP el 1 de mayo de 2022 reduciría los aumentos en las facturas que los clientes experimentarían después del cambio de tarifas propuesto por la Compañía el 1 de noviembre de 2021, dependiendo de su clasificación de tarifas y uso. Además, los impactos en las facturas de los clientes de C&I variarán según la clasificación de tarifas y el nivel de uso.
